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Sumatra earthquake measured 9.3

By analyzing seismograms, Evanston, Illlinois' Northwestern University seismologists have determined that the December 26, 2004 Sumatra earthquake that set off a deadly tsunami throughout the Indian Ocean was three times larger than originally thought, making it the second largest earthquake ever instrumentally recorded and explaining why the tsunami was so destructive. These results also indicate that the chances of similar large tsumanis occurring in the same area are reduced.

The Sumatra earthquake's rupture zone was much larger than previously thought. Initial calculations of 9.0 did not take slow slip into account. Slow slip occurs when the fault, delineated by aftershocks, shifts more slowly. The additional energy released by slow slip along the 1,200-kilometer long fault played a key role in generating the devastating tsunami. The largest slip resulted from rupture of the northern segment of the fault, closest to Sri Lanka and India. Because the entire rupture zone slipped, strain accumulated from subduction of the Indian plate beneath the Burma microplate has been released, leaving no immediate danger of a comparable ocean-wide tsunami being generated on this segment of the plate boundary. However, the danger of a local tsunami due to a powerful aftershock or a large tsunami resulting from a great earthquake on segments to the south remains.

Gigantic earthquakes, such as the Sumatra quake are rare. The largest earthquake ever recorded, which measured 9.5, was in Chile on May 22, 1960.

MAGS Roadcut

WC McDANIEL: MAGS Roadcut continues to focus on fossils this month by looking at how the geologic time periods' got their names:

- The three geologic eras are the PALEOZOIC, MESOZOIC and CENOZOIC, from the Greek for ancient, middle and recent life. They are divided into 11 periods, most of them named for the places where rocks from the period were first discovered.
- The Cambrian Period (570-500 million years ago) is named for Cambria, or Wales. The next two periods also received Welsh names: Ordovician and Silurian for two Welsh tribes, the Ordovicies and the Siluries.
- The Devonian is named for Devonshire, England, and the Cretaceous comes from "creta", Latin for chalk, referring to the White Cliffs of Dover, England.
- The Jurassic is named for the Jura Mountains in Germany, and the Permian for Perm is Russia's Ural Mountains.
- The Triassic got its name because it was easily divided into three parts. In North America the Carboniferous (carbon = coal) is subdivided into the Mississippian, named for the Mississippi River and the Pennsylvanian, named for the coal deposits first discovered in the state of Pennsylvania.

The Diamond Hill Mine: The Diamond Hill Mine has been producing skeletal, amethyst and smoky quartz crystals as well as quartz scepters and an assortment of pegmatite minerals for many years. FEE: \$10.00 a person/per day. Children under 13 are free. Pay for both days on the 20th if staying to camp overnight. Everyone attending will have to sign a release wavier.

WHEN: Saturday, March 19th. and Sunday, March 20th. We will meet at 9:00am on both days.

BRING: You will need to bring a pick and shovel as well as hard rock tools and safety glasses. Be sure and bring plenty of newspaper to wrap your finds in. A lot of the quartz has iron-staining on it. Frequently the stains vary in color from face to face on the crystals and make for very attractive specimens as long as you don't ding them up! Lunch, bug spray, some sun protection, and don't forget some good shoes or boots.

DIRECTIONS: We will meet at the mine at 9:00am. Take I-85 to exit 19A in South Carolina. Exit and go south on Highway 76/28 a short distance and the highways will split. Stay on highway 28 south to Antreville. There is a big church at the intersection of Highway 284 and Highway 28 1/2 mile south of Antreville. Turn onto 284 and go 2.3 miles and take a right on Suber Road, SC Road S-01-508. Be careful not to turn into the folks' driveway just before the road there. Go seven tenths of a mile and you will see on your right a gravel road, Diamond Mine Road, SC Road S-1-538. Turn right and go half a mile and the mine entrance will be on your right.
