T. O.Fuller State Park, originally designated as an area for an Archaeological Park."

Civilian Conservation Corps workers clearing the area to create what is now T. O. Fuller State Park discovered evidence of Native American habitation. Some of those who founded MAGS were involved in early work at the site. An early issue (Volume 3, Number 9) of MAGS Rockhound News featured an article titled "CHUCAL-ISSA (House Abandoned), An Archaeological Project of the Tennessee Division of State Parks," by Charles Nash, Archaeologist, Tennessee Division of State Parks. The museum, now part of the University of Memphis, opened to the public in 1956. You can read more on MAGS involvement in the development of Chucalissa on the MAGS website (page URL memphisgeology.org/an chucalissa.htm).

MAGS is closely involved with Chucalissa today. Dr Connolly's talk will cover MAGS related projects with collections, projects for which MAGS provides financial support such as the replica house, archaeology lab updates, new directions in educational programs and public offerings, collaborative research projects with Chucalissa's sister museum in Peru, and a general activity update. The first of these refers in part to the MAGS Archaeology Interest Group, which meets at Chucalissa and is currently working on educational displays of some of the artifacts.

The first part of our club's

name highlights our support of archaeological work, and the March program will bring us up to date on some of our current involvement in that field.

ISCS SandFest 2013

A Slightly Overdue Report Lori Carter



The Georgia Mineral Society and Tellus Science Museum in Cartersville, Georgia, co-hosted ISCS SandFest 2013 last November. Sand collectors converged at the museum from all over the U.S. and one gentleman even came all the way from Germany! The conference began with a full day of sand collecting field trips (3!) where attendees quickly became friends with each other. The next two days were filled with more field trips, presentations, discussion forums, and workshops. All hands were on deck for Tellus Family Science Night where attendees helped children make their own sand cards with 6 different sands donated by ISCS and GMS members. The Martin Microscope company

(www.martinmicroscope.com) generously loaned 12 stereomicroscopes for viewing the sand cards, plus 2 large monitors with video adapters so everyone could see the beautiful sand. One GMS member even had a cell phone adapter so people were able to photograph sand through a microscope! After a whirlwind of activities, the conference wound down with a silent auction followed by a banquet, then a live auction presented by the consummate GMS auctioneer, Kim Cochran. Dr. Robert Simmons, Program Director for Biological Imaging at Georgia State University, was the keynote speaker. His presentation was filled with images of art inspired by the world of microscopy. Some of his photomicrographs were on exhibit at the museum during the conference, too. The conference closed with an International Sand Collectors Society breakfast meeting and one more field trip. It was a unique confluence of tremendously talented attendees, more than a year of planning and preparation, and a world class venue. Everyone arrived without knowing what to expect but left with baggies of sand, new friends, and the satisfaction of a singularly spectacular sand experience. Reminder: MAGS field trip rules:

- 1. Field trips are open only to current MAGS members. Exception: if MAGS participates in any field trip sharing program with other clubs their members may participate if it is a shared trip
- MAGS members will not contact private landowners to obtain permission to collect on sites where the owner has granted the club permission to collect. A member who is unsure of the location will seek a decision by the Board of Directors.

Jewelry Bench Tips by *Brad Smith*

NO-MAR PLIERS

Pliers can often leave nicks and scratches on your work. If this is giving you a problem, first take a close look at the plier jaws. New tools can be a little rough. I typically relieve any sharp edges, sand away any tool marks and give working areas a quick polish.

If that doesn't solve the problem, you probably need to cover the jaws. Plastic electrical tape provides a quick fix but can leave messy adhesive on the jaws. Dips don't seem to last very long.



A quick and easy way I've found is to slip a length of 1/8 dia vinyl tubing over each jaw. It's quick and leaves no sticky residue. Only problem is that it increases the size of the plier jaws a bit. The tubing can be found in a store that sells aquarium supplies.

Missing Link?



DNA analysis of a Clovis boy's skeleton has provided important clues about both the origins and the genetic legacy of the people who manufactured

Clovis tools. The skeleton came from the only known Clovis burial site, found in 1968 on property in central Montana that belonged to the parents of Sarah Anzick, a coauthor of the present study.

"Genetic studies tell us these were the remains of a boy," said Michael Waters of Texas A&M, another co-author. "Physical anthropological studies tell us he was I to I.5 years old, and radio-carbon dating tells us this burial took place about 12,600 years ago, at the end of the Clovis era."

It is generally believed that the Clovis ultimately derived from Asia and were directly related to contemporary Native Americans. An alternative "Solutrean" hypothesis postulates that the Clovis predecessors emigrated from southwestern Europe during the Last Glacial Maximum.

The scientists managed to recover the first complete genome sequence of an ancient North American, despite how badly preserved the DNA in the remains were. The results support the first hypothesis mentioned above.

peoples around the world," coauthor Eske Willerslev of the University of Copenhagen said. "We can also see from the genome study that this Anzick population is the direct ancestor to many Native Americans to date. As such, our study is in agreement with the view that present-day Native

Americans are direct descendants of the first peoples in the Americas."

The scientists also discovered evidence of a deep genetic divergence that occurred between northern Native American groups and those from Central and South America that happened before the Clovis era. Specifically, although most South Americans and Mexicans are part of the Anzick lineage and therefore Clovis, northern Canadian groups belong to another lineage.
